

Porci's Ocean Patrol

Series 1: Episode 1 – Notes for Educators

Introduction

Welcome to Series 1: Episode 1 of Porci's Ocean Patrol (POP), a short, beautifully animated video that educates Reception to Year 4 students about the 'Great Southern Reef'.

These notes for educators are designed to provide an outline of what young viewers can expect to see and discover when they view Episode 1. The notes also provide educators with key Episode 1 information to assist with student learning.

General introductory information relating to Porci's Ocean Patrol, and the presenters who appear in the videos, can be found on the Marine Discovery Centre website.

Let's get started!

Series 1: Episode 1 (Run time – 7 minutes and 43 seconds)

Episode 1 begins with a short, general introduction for students to the 'Great Southern Reef', located off the coast of South Australia, and to the creatures that exist from the surface to the bottom of the ocean.

This episode (as with all future episodes) has three major themes:

Question 1 (35 seconds into the episode)

Ocean Patroller, Ollie, asks the first question:

"What happens to the shampoo bubbles after I rinse them out of my hair and they go down the drain?"

Georgie (and Porci) let students know that all water from a bath or shower (after some treatment) goes down the drain and ends up in the ocean.

It is explained to students that a major problem in our oceans are microbeads, which are about 1mm in size (or smaller) and are often found in soap, shampoo, face cleansers and even in toothpaste. They don't break down and marine creatures eat them.

Georgie provides a list of some harmful ingredients to avoid:

- Polyethylene (PE)
- Polypropylene (PP)
- Polyethylene terephthalate (PET)
- Polyemethyl methacrylate (PMMA)
- Nylon (PA)

Students also learn that any items discovered at home containing these ingredients should not be thrown away and can be sent back to the manufacturer explaining why their product will no longer be used or purchased.

Question 2 (2 minutes and 43 seconds into the episode)

Ocean Patroller, Billy, asks the second question:

"Is it true that Leafy Sea Dragons slurp up their food using their long noses like a drinking straw?"

Georgie explains that Leafy Sea Dragons (also called 'Leafys') only live in one place in the world, the 'Great Southern Reef'. The Leafy is South Australia's marine emblem.

Students learn that Leafy's favourite crustation to eat is the tiny 'Mysid', and because Leafys have no teeth, they actually do suck them up through their pipe-like snout and small mouth.

Students will also discover that Leafys have perfect camouflage as a protection from being eaten by other, fish so they are quite difficult to see in the water. Leafys are now a protected species, because unfortunately, some divers started taking them home as pets.



Question 3 (4 minutes and 40 seconds into the episode)

Ocean Patroller, Emily, asks Karno the third question:

"Can you please teach me some Aboriginal words?"

Karno explains that there are about 150 Aboriginal languages in Australia and in the traditional land of the Adelaide Plains it is the Kaurna language.

Karno then goes on to teach students the song – "Heads, shoulders, knees and toes" in the Kaurna language (5 minutes and 20 seconds into the episode).

Emily and Porci sing along, and the following words appear in both English and Kaurna on the screen.

Mukarda (head), Kartaka (shoulders)

Mardpa (knees) and Gina (toes)

Mina (eyes), Yuri (ears)
